Cubs Follow the Law of the Pack



The Cub Scout program started in 1930 and centers on home and neighborhood involvement. The family approach gives Cubs safe ground to learn the values of their parents and leaders.

Cubs benefit from well-trained leaders with a mission of helping them develop into good citizens. As they move into the future, they will be Webelos — loyal scouts who are ready to become Boy Scouts and continue their scouting adventures in troops, venture crews, ships and varsity teams.

The Arrow of Light is the highest award in Cub Scouts and shows a boy is ready to crossover and join a Boy Scout troop.



The Finest Investment

George Washington Thomas was born in 1876, the youngest of six children. At the age of 27, he left Kansas and came to Ninnekah in Indian Territory to farm. He soon added cattle and opened a store in the town’s first brick building. For a nickel, you could get a slice of cheese and handful of crackers.

Thomas stocked his store by buying what the neighboring farmers produced. One year after statehood, he added a grain elevator to handle wheat and corn.

He bought land along the Frisco railroad southwest of Chickasha and operated a general store, grain elevator, lumberyard and cotton gin. He also served as postmaster and was a member of the school board.

When he was 42, he married the local schoolteacher, Miss Hazel Bloss, and started a family. He devoted his time to raising crops and cattle. He also raised two boys, Harper and George, Jr.

The Lions Club of Chickasha sponsored a Boy Scout troop in the 1930s and young Harper Thomas was one of the charter members. His dad agreed to donate materials and pay for construction of a cabin in a canyon that ran through one of his pastures. The boys helped build the cabin and the troop used it for many years.

The citizens of Grady County elected Thomas to the state legislature in 1928. He continued to serve his community and state as a member of the Oklahoma Cattlemen’s Association, Chickasha Fin and Feather Club, director of the First National Bank of Chickasha, charter member of the National Cowboy Hall of Fame and member of the Masonic Lodge.

Thomas bought this quarter section of land in 1935 for \$2,800. A few months later, at a Black Beaver Council board meeting, he offered to give it to the Boy Scouts of America for a council camp. Thousands of boys have used it in the years since it was established and many improvements have been made, including a swimming pool, dining hall and water system.

Thomas later told a Black Beaver Council board member that the gift of land to the Boy Scouts was the finest investment he ever made.

“Invest in the human soul.

Who knows—it might be a diamond in the rough.” – Mary McLeod Bethune (1875-1955). Bethune was an American civil rights leader and educator who started a school for girls in Daytona, FL and became an advisor to US President Franklin Roosevelt.
